
## JOHN RENNIE AND ROBERT STEVENSON BELL ROCK LIGHTHOUSE



#### NORTH RONALDSAY LIGHTHOUSE



Below right: North Ronaldsay still has its original Fresnel lens.






#### THOMAS SMITH




Two lighthouses, 60ft apart, were built on Pentland Skerries by Thomas Smith. Established 1794. These lights were later replaced by taller towers, 100ft apart with Robert Stevenson as the Engineer. Today only one light is operational.






Above: Tarbat Ness Lighthouse designed and built by Robert Stevenson. Established 1830.

Left: Lantern showing the emergency back up light.


Opposite page: The view from the top of the tower.

Established 1892. Fair Isle South was automated in 1998 and


was Scotland's last manned lighthouse.

Flannan Isles Lighthouse designed and built by David A. Stevenson. Established 1899. Most notable for the disappearance of the three keepers in December 1900.




Above: The former Shore-Station for the Flannan Isles at Breasclete.

Below: The fine detail from above the door at the Shore Station. Inscription: IN SALUTEM OMNIUM 1899




## ROBERT STEVENSON ISLE OF MAY LIGHTHOUSE



Isle of May Lighthouse designed and built by Robert Stevenson. Established 1816. The Isle of May was the site of the earliest coal-fired light in Scotland dating back to 1636,


The original tower, though modified, is still in existence.



Internal view of the Isle of May stairwell painted to give the effect of dressed ashlar stone.



Above: Scurdie Ness Lighthouse was designed and built by David and Thomas Stevenson. Established 1870.


Right: The internal brick tube from which the original clockwork weight would rise and fall, now used to channel the cables connected to the automation of the station.








Above: Ardnamurchan

## ALAN STEVENSON SKERRYVORE LIGHTHOUSE



Skerryvore Lighthouse was designed and built by Alan Stevenson. Established 1844, It stands 48 metres high and is built of pink Ross of Mull granite, apart from the four lower courses of gneiss rock from Tiree.

Below: Hynish was chosen as the location for a shore station and harbour as it was the closest location to Skerryvore, the harbour regularly silted up and Alan Stevenson had to design a fresh water flushing system connected to a reservoir to remove the silt.


Below left: Corsewall is one of the few Stevenson lights to have an open spiral staircase.

Below right: Following the automation of the station in 1994 the former keepers' cottages were sold and converted into the Corsewall Lighthouse Hotel.






## DAVID A. STEVENSON RATTRAY HEAD LIGHTHOUSE



#### ROBERT STEVENSON GIRDLE NESS LIGHTHOUSE




Girdle Ness Lighthouse designed and built by Robert Stevenson. Established 1833. Originally the light showed two lights, both fixed. The lower light was in a glazed gallery about one third of the way up the tower. The lower light was discontinued in 1890.




Above: Covesea Skerries Lighthouse designed and built by Alan Stevenson. Established 1846.



Neist Point Lighthouse designed and huilt by David A. Stevenson. Established 1910. Mr W. Hugh MacDonald from Oban was the huilding contractor for the lighthouse and dwellings which cost £4,350.
